




Introduction

Africa has been highlighted as one of the continents to experience the brunt of the climate crisis. The impact of climate change has become a reality in Africa ranging from severe and prolonged droughts, flooding, acidification of oceans and warming of surface waters, rising temperatures and sea levels, desertification and soil erosion which continually threatens food security. These are issues that will have a great impact on our vulnerable continent. For effective decisions to be made, and for solutions to be designed it is essential to illuminate these issues.

Background

The Environment Through Your Eyes Photo Project arose as a result of lack of visual effects of climate change and environmental pollution in Nigeria.

The overall aim of the project was to stir a sense of responsibility and accountability in citizens of Nigeria as well as highlight that effects of climate change are not abstract or only being felt in foreign countries.





Project Goals and Objectives

Clean Tech Hub (CTH) provided an opportunity for the general public and Clean Technology Hub volunteers to showcase photography and storytelling skills on environmental conservation and climate change issues within their community, by sharing real time pictures on a variety of environmental issues around them. These issues could include but are not specific to air, water, soil, solid waste pollution, forest fires, chemical or oil spills in waterways/bodies, illegal dumping, plastic pollution, affected flora and fauna etc.

Project objectives of The Environment Through Your Eyes are as follows:

- 1. Increase public awareness and amplify the environmental issues and effects of climate change faced in various parts of Nigeria through CTH's digital and social media platforms.
- 2. Spotlight peculiar environmental and climate stories in various regions of Nigeria and improve public perception on these issues.
- 3. Highlight how these issues affect environmental health and everyday life and increase citizens participation on environmental and climate issues within Nigeria.
- 4. Create a compendium of images and stories to serve as literature for communities, civil societies, policy makers and international organizations driving sustainability and climate action.

Location - Bonny Camp and Kiddies beach at Lagos **Date** - Bonny Camp 2020 / Kiddies beach 2017.

Location - Lighthouse Beach, Tarkwa Bay **Date** - 24th August, 2021

Flexible, durable and not easily degraded are some of the properties of plastic that made them so attractive to the public. These same properties are why it is so difficult to get rid of them when dumped in the environment.

At least 14 million tons of plastic ends up in the ocean every year. This picture taken shows plastic waste causing extensive pollution on the shoreline shows that plastic pollution poses a threat to human health, marine animals and the tourism industry in many coastal countries.





Location: Tivoli Gardens Date: 18th May, 2021

Nigeria ranks amongst the top twenty countries with the worst plastic waste management with over 200,000 metric tonnes of plastic discharged into the Atlantic Ocean each year.

Plastic waste generated by tourist activities and those transported by polluted rivers from inland are poorly managed and eventually ends up in swash zones of beaches like the one shown in the image turned on by Adedtotun Ajibade.

This image shows the PET bottles packed for transport to recyclers. A majority of recycling done in Nigeria is informal and consists of individuals and SMEs that execute the collection and sale of recyclables and reusable materials usually with no support from government institutions.

While recycling is not the absolute answer to solving Nigeria's solid waste concerns, it is essential for generating growth opportunities for the economy while reducing the degradation of landscapes and water bodies.


Location: Lokoja, Kogi State Nigeria

Location: Oworonshoki, Lagos state

One of the more unknown effects of global warming and rise in sea levels is salt water intrusion. As the sea levels rise along the coasts, saltwater can move into the land and displace or mix with fresh groundwater in coastal aquifers. Oshinaike Gbenga who occasionally visits Ekore, a rural community within the Oworonoshoki area in Lagos state discovered that this fresh water source had begun to mix with water from the sea. This part of the river which previously wasn't salty was used mostly to wash clothes and boiled for drinking.
